CES Counselor's Corner

In counseling class kindergarten will use the Developing Understanding of Self and Others (DUSO) program. DUSO encourages children to develop positive self-images, to become more aware of the relationship between themselves and other people, and to recognize their own needs and goals. Activities include stories, puppetry, role play, feeling word activities, career awareness, and singing.

First grade will be using the Froggy program this year. Froggy teaches students about a variety of topics. A typical lesson begins with a story about Froggy and concludes with a paper reinforcing the lesson.

Second grade is doing the Pumsy program this year. The goal of the Pumsy program is to help students make good choices on a daily basis. Pumsy is a dragon. Pumsy provides simple and practical suggestions for managing situations frequently encountered by children. Some of the situations we will work on are being teased or rejected, not getting their way, and facing difficult challenges.

Third and fourth graders are currently learning the problem solving model. There are five steps to the model. I encourage you to ask your child about this model and to even try it with your own family.

How To Solve Problems

What is the problem? (Nonjudgmental statement)

What are some solutions? (Brainstorm)

For each solution ask:

Is it safe?

How might people feel?

Is it fair?

Will it work?

Choose a solution and use it.

Is it working? If not, what can I do now?

TO: ALL PARENTS

A REMINDER FROM THE SCHOOL NURSE

Kansas law requires written permission from the parent and a signed order from the physician for any child taking medication at school (including over-the-counter). This Permission for Medication form needs to be done each year. If your child is to take any medication at school we must have a current permission form on file.

This also applies to special dietary needs. If your child has special dietary needs a special form needs to be filled out and placed on file each year.

Children who use an inhaler need to have a current Permission for Medication form and (preferably) an inhaler that can be left at school. If you prefer your child (Jr High/High School age) self-administer their inhaler please contact the school nurse for the proper paperwork.

The library staff likes it that way as it means that we have new books being processed in each building, greeting new students and staff, and the entire staff members are doing many different tasks. Change is often scary, but at the same time very challenging. Our students are our first priority throughout the district.

We intend to bring smiles to the students as they start the year off reading and sharing their favorite authors and books with each other at school as well as at home with their families. Please take our challenge and take a walk with your child as he/she explores new books, places, and exciting adventures through the wonderful world of reading.

If the child isn't reading yet or just a little anxious, this would be a good time to let him/her do a picture walk through the story. Your child will share what he/she thinks the book is about. Sometimes you may be surprised how accurate their "picture story" to the real story. Good readers also enjoy sharing books with other siblings. Please take the time to spend a few moments each night reading as a family. You will be glad you did! . Studies show that the more children hear books read aloud, the better and more enjoyable reading will be.

All libraries this year will be focusing on authors and discovering new authors as well as those that are already popular. There will be many new adventures and surprises in each library that may be a little unexpected or unusual to the students and/or staff. We hope that your child shares these little tidbits with you. If you would like to participate in some way, please contact the school. We are always looking for volunteers. You may have favorite authors that you would like to share with the students.

Other changes taking place this year involve technology. The libraries will be updating our electronic catalog to one that is more user friendly. Eventually the libraries will be online where students/parents or others in our communities may explore our collection on the internet. Once this technology is up and running, students/parents will be able to login to the electronic catalog (InfoCentre) with their student ID and password. Patrons will be able access his/her account to check on due dates or book titles. Through e-mail or phone, students may reserve books in any of the buildings or take care of other matters or concerns.

These changes will allow our patrons and community to explore the amazing educational resources that are available in our district. This will allow sharing of expensive sets and/or selections. The library budgets will be stretched further for different resources and not duplicate what is already in the district. Teachers will be able to do bibliographies and request the list from the library of their choice.

Our patrons will also be exploring a **Learning Station Desktop** of their very own once accounts are set up this year. Some staff and students have already had a little taste of this in the spring and summer. You will be informed of the changes as they take place either through the USD 333 District newsletter or on the website. This will be a wonderful tool for everyone to help with safe web searching and educational based databases available through the Kansas Library System and Kan-Ed.

As you see, many changes are occurring throughout the USD 333 library system. Do not hesitate to contact us if you need help accessing some of the new and interesting changes.

There will be other new resources to share with you as the year progresses. Information literacy for the students will be explored in many educational ways. So stay tuned for further information.
